

Where to go in Australia...

Australia is similar in size to the United States; also offering a variety of destination experiences nationwide. The challenge is deciding what is of most interest to be visited based on your length of stay. Economy Class International airline tickets include up to 3 flights for free within Australia allowing you to visit 4 places only paying tax. The destinations are basically City, Reef, and Outback. Once you advise your preference, I will provide more specific information.


Sydney, NSW, caters to tourists and businessmen. The average stay is 3 nights. I have been five times and have yet to see it all. Most famous is the Sydney Opera House & Harbour Bridge.

Cairns, QLD, is perfect for a day on the Great Barrier Reef and to visit the world's oldest rainforest, hold a Koala, a crocodile and discover the indigenous culture of Aborigines.

Ayers Rock, NT, is the true Outback with enormous rock formations that appear to change colors and are millions of years old, plus world's best star gazing. The average stay is 2 nights.



Melbourne, VIC, is in the center of the smallest state for easy access to surrounding areas like seeing kangaroos and penguins in the wild. There are pedestrian only streets with sidewalk cafes catering to the locals, the best shopping as the Fashion and plus Sports Capitals of Australia.




Adelaide, SA, is the gateway to Kangaroo Island which has more kangaroos/koalas in the wild than anywhere else; there is wine blending at Penfold's Winery, driving cattle on horseback, and immersion into what is a German village complete with landscape, cuckoo clocks and schnitzel.



Brisbane, QLD, is most famous for the Crocodile Hunter, Steve Irwin's, Australia Zoo. Yet its secrets are feeding wild dolphins at sunset, the world's largest sand island, a rainforest, the ultimate Koala experience and sand boarding on dunes. It's a golden coast paradise for surfers.



Tasmania is an island off the southern coast consisting primarily of National Parks; boasting the world's cleanest air as well as the Tasmanian devil and platypus in the wild. It's a hiker's dream.



Darwin, NT, is where scenes from the movie Australia were filmed. You can swim under a waterfall with 7000+ year old water and see ancient Aborigine rock art dating back thousands of years. I took The Ghan train from here and that is the best Outback Journey in the Red Center.



Western Australia is famous for Ningaloo Reef swimming with whale sharks and dolphins. As the largest state, the Kimberley's in the north represent the country's natural history; plus riding camels on a beach at sunset to see the "stairway to heaven" reflection water to sky. Perth is the capital with gold mining towns nearby. At the Perth Mint you can personally mold a bar of gold.
